

Regulations for Graduate Students of Educational Communications Technology Programs (Master's and Ph.D. Programs)

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Article 1: These regulations are established in accordance with the "National Taipei University of Education Academic Regulations," "National Taipei University of Education Course Selection Regulations," and "National Taipei University of Education Regulations for Course Selection by Master's In-Service Program Students."

Article 2: The total credits required for graduation and the distribution of required and elective credits for graduate students of this department are based on the curriculum structure of the year in which the student enters, following the "National Taipei University of Education Academic Regulations," "National Taipei University of Education Course Selection Regulations," and "National Taipei University of Education Regulations for Course Selection by Master's In-Service Program Students."

Article 3: For students of this department, the maximum number of elective credits per semester for regular program students is 13 credits, and the minimum is 3 credits. For in-service program students, the maximum is 12 credits, and the minimum is 3 credits.

Article 4: Students who have completed asynchronous distance learning courses offered by this department before enrollment or who have taken relevant courses at other institutions may be granted credits for up to 9 credits for regular program students and up to 8 credits for in-service program students.

Article 5: With the approval of the advisor (or supervising professor) and the department head, students are allowed to cross-register for courses offered during daytime or evening, summer sessions, inter-institute, and inter-university courses. However, the maximum number of cross-registered credits is limited to 6. To include cross-registered credits towards the graduation requirements, students must submit a cross-registration application form (T011) to the department office before taking the course.

After approval from the curriculum and communication subcommittee meeting, these credits can be counted towards graduation.

Article 6: In cases of cheating or plagiarism in assignments, reports, or thesis examinations, upon verification and confirmation, the corresponding subject will be marked as failed, and the thesis examination will not be passed.

Article 7: Graduate students are required to complete two semesters of service learning courses. Those who do not pass must retake the course. In-service program students are exempted from this requirement. For details about the content and implementation of service learning courses, please refer to the guidelines for service learning courses in the department.

Article 8: Doctoral program students who fulfill the required graduation credits upon completing the program and pass the doctoral degree qualification examination will be granted a degree. Master's program students who complete 20 credits (16 credits for in-service program students), including the required course "Research Methods" and departmental service courses, and have their thesis proposal approved by the curriculum and communication subcommittee meeting, may apply to the department for thesis plan review. Specific details regarding thesis plans and degree examinations will be established in separate guidelines.

Article 9: Other graduation requirements are as follows:

1. Master's program students must jointly publish at least one short paper with their supervising professor in a professional academic journal or at an academic conference with paper review requirements before the master's thesis defense. The same paper may only be submitted by one student. Students who have already published a paper must submit relevant supporting documents to prove this and fill out the graduation requirement review application form (T007) before the thesis defense in that semester. After review by the curriculum and communication subcommittee meeting, the student's eligibility to meet graduation requirements will be determined.

Doctoral program students in the education and communication subcommittee must follow the guidelines for strengthening academic guidance and enhancing research capabilities for graduate students. They should publish academic papers in officially published academic journals, academic books, or academic conferences, and submit proof of publication before the degree examination. A total of 10 points are required for certification.

2. Within one month after the completion of the degree examination, students must submit the revised and finalized thesis in both printed and electronic formats, following university regulations.

3. Complete the student handbook for the education and communication subcommittee (T009).

Article 10: Graduate students may participate in a maximum of two research projects conducted by the department, other departments, or external institutions.

Article 11: These regulations shall be implemented upon approval by the curriculum

and communication subcommittee meeting and presented to the departmental meeting for record. Any amendments to these regulations shall follow the same process.
